Then on the way back from Chile the bus companies went on strike and so we ended up flying back to Lima. We arrived home totally exhausted but unharmed and mission accomplished. Praise the Lord!



A Changed Life

Every time Bruce Benson (SIL translator) goes to Llata, the municipal capital of the Huamalíes Quechua, he goes to the flagraising ceremony in the main town square. He was there in May, 1989, the day the terrorists lowered the Peruvian flag, ransacked the municipal building, and declared that the revolution had come and they were now ruling. He, his wife, Jan, and 14-year old son, Bryan, were held captive that day with threats of death. They were later released.





On Sept 21st, the flag was once again raised in the public ceremony in the same town square, preceding the parade that ended in the stadium where the Huamalíes Quechua New Testament was dedicated to God before 3000 people—the same plaza and town where 14 years before terrorists claimed

to rule! And in the crowd was one of the terrorists, Jorge, who had participated that day 14 years before.

Jorge had become a Christian while in prison. This was his first trip back and he publicly asked forgiveness of the police, the town authorities and the Quechua people for all they had suffered and the lives lost due to his and his



comrades' crimes. He and the Llata police chief, also a Christian, testified to God's saving and forgiving grace.

Jorge is now a missionary to

Argentina directing a Youth With a Mission (YWAM) Bible school that sends out missionaries around the world. He has a special passion for youth as he knows how sad and unhappy his own youth was and how he found meaning, fulfillment and love through Christ.

Yaminahua New Testament

Lucy Eakin began working with the Yaminahua in 1975. You can imagine her excitement to unwrap the first Yaminahua New Testament. The fruit of her labor was especially evident in the lives and hearts of those gathered to dedicate the Yaminahua New Testament.

Sometimes the older Yaminahuas reminisce about chanting all night under the influence of ayahuasca, a hallucinogenic drug, in order to contact the spirits. The living Word of God in

their hearts has now allowed them to have peace, both with God and with men from other tribal groups with whom they used to fight.
